Museum Report

Following six months of planning, negotiating, reviewing, phoning, meeting and... well you get the picture, the long awaited stairway and retaining wall got under way last October. The project which was funded through a grant from the North Carolina Dept. of Transportation connects the Visitor Center and the McElroy House.

The project got a slow start because the grant required involvement of the Federal, State and County Government. We owe a big thank-you to all three county commissioners, the county manager and the county's attorney for their hard work and perseverance.

The second concern that hampered progress involved the D.O.T. restriction on the retaining wall. The grant provided funds to build only a wall needed to stabilize and to which secure the stairway. The Chamber of Commerce, through the Joint Steering Committee, provided the additional funds needed to complete the entire wall.

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Annual Meeting

The annual membership meeting of the Yancey History Association will be held Saturday, May 16th at 7:30 at the Yancey County Library Annex. Items on the agenda include the election of officers, adoption of the 1998 budget, museum and executive directors report. All members are encouraged to attend.

The book contains articles on African Americans, Anglo- Americans, Native Americans, Revolutionary War Veterans, the Civil War, natural disasters, mining, education, religion, and much more. Most articles are accompanied by one or more photos.

Dr. Allen Paul Speer Voices From Cemetery Hill

Saturday, June 6th at 7:30. The author and his wife, Dr. Janet Barton Speer will present a forty-minute readers Theatre presentation which includes samples of Col. William Asbury Speer's Diary, Reports and Letters. A personal insight to the Civil War. A discussion will follow.

Robert S. Brunk May We All Remember Well, Vol. 1

Thursday, July 23rd at 7:30. This first volume is sub-titled A Journal of the History & Cultures of Western North Carolina. Mr Brunk will discuss highlights of the 18 articles he has included in this book. Topics range from Architecture to Hook Rug and Chair Making.

Charles F. Price Hiwassee

Thursday, August 20th at 7:30. This novel is the first in a trilogy with the second book due out next year. Mr. Price will talk about the first book, set during the Civil War, as well as the second book, set during the post War period of reconstruction.

The Next issue of Estatoee will begin Lloyd Bailey's 3 part series on the Moore Family who resided in the McElroy House during the turn of the Century.

Funding Priorities for the Museum Project

The following list is an estimate of the costs involved and the milestones that will be past as funds become available to proceed with the restoration of the McElroy House.

When we reach this point of the McElroy House restoration we will determine the best use of the completed ground floor. The displays housed in the Living History Area will moved to the east room (revolving display room) allowing the full use of those two areas. The long range use of the west room will be a Parlor with mid 1800's reproduction furniture, however it may be used to house the Civil War and other displays until the upstairs rooms are ready for those permanent displays.

The above estimates are based on what it would cost to accomplish each task at current cost levels and with the knowledge we have at hand. Our goal is to complete this work within two years. The remaining restoration work includes two upstairs rooms and the hallway. The landscaping, including fencing and herb garden, will also need to be addressed at that time.

Museum continued

The most challenging problem of the project was the site itself. The D.O.T. engineers were deeply concerned that the bank was so steep that extensive and expensive reinforcing would be required to safeguard the workers from a possible cavein. Once work began it became clear that the bank was solid and work moved along quickly.

Gary Adkins and his crew worked nearly non-stop to complete the project ahead of a rapidly approaching winter. The final inspection was done at years end much to the surprise and delight of the D.O.T. engineers.

Gary Adkins made a substantial in kind contribution to this project and we all owe him a word of thanks.

Unfortunately we came up empty handed in the last round of State funding. We are currently pursuing a wide range of Foundation Grants. For a progress report be sure to attend our May meeting or watch for the next issue of the Estatoee.

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
