October 5th - Family Heritage Day

The Yancey History Association will present a day of fun and informative sharing on Sat. from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. This is a free event, however donations will be gladly accepted. Y.H.A. will be selling food and drinks to cover event costs.

If you have an interest in storytelling and mountain lore, your Civil War ancestors, American-Indian culture or ancestry, Yancey County genealogy and the rich heritage behind the strong willed pioneers who settled this region after the American Revolution you won't want to miss this event. The following professionals will be at the Museum to answer your questions on these topics.

Elizabeth Baird Hardy is a professional storyteller whose tales come from her Baird ancestors, and from her extended immediate family in Kentucky. Her "Tales from Two Creeks" is a collection of stories collected from her father's family on Jellico Creek and her mother's family on Indian Creek. She carefully weaves together snippets of tales into stories that are funny, heart-breaking, exciting, scary and always full of mountain life. Elizabeth is an English instructor at Caldwell Community College, where she also teaches Southern Culture. She has written articles on storytelling, historic interpretation, and mountain women during the Civil War.

Michael Hardy is a Civil War historian, freelance writer and guest historical speaker whose primary area of focus is the Mountain South. He has written articles for several national publications including; North & South and America's Civil War. His history of the Thirty-seventh North Carolina Troops will be published by McFarland early next year. Michael is currently vice-president of the Yancey History Assn. and has been one of the History Museum's most dedicated volunteers since the Museum opened in 1999. As assistant librarian at Caldwell Community College, he teaches popular workshops on genealogy and family research.

Jacque Red Leaf Garneau is an American-Indian spiritual leader who is listed in "Who's Who in the World for the 21st Century". She is a Published author, ordained minister, Chief of the Seventh Fire Indian Community and clan mother. Red Leaf has spent the past thirty years teaching an understanding of the American-Indian ways of approaching, seeing, and practicing spirituality, traditions, history, ceremony and spiritual beliefs.

Margaret Griffith is a retired Yancey County school teacher who's ancestors include some of the earliest pioneers that settled Yancey County in the late 1700's and early 1800's. Margaret is organizing a team of local family historians who will offer a broad range of family history in an informal setting. You are encouraged to bring your family pictures and info. to share with others.

December 6th & 7th - McElroy Holiday House

Yancey County students and professional interior decorators are teaming up to decorate the McElroy House for the holidays. 

Y.H.A. received the gracious donation of this beautiful circa 1900 American Indian Ceremonial Basket from Jacque Redleaf Garneau to raise money for the History Museum's operations. The Double Bottom Masters basket with Hoop of the World handle is made from river cane and contains objects of great significance in American Indian ceremonies. The contents include: a white rabbit pelt, a turtle shell filled with cedar from a fallen tree that lived in an ancient Cherokee burial ground, Indian tobacco wrapped in red cloth, Indian corn, sage and a wreath of sweet grass that were used at the Sundance Ceremony. Redleaf will be on hand to answer questions and share the lore behind this very special basket. Y.H.A. is selling \$1.00 tickets or six for \$5.00.
