From the President.

This will be my last column as president of the YHA since I have now served my limit of two years (plus a few months). I want to acknowledge the hard work done by board members , staff and a few volunteers. The Winnie Lou Garden is now a reality, and we had a successful dedication in April. The Battle of Burnsville commemoration this year saw the first Civil War re-enactment in the town. Attendance was good despite the hard rains during the weekend. Interesting programs have been presented, if not well attended. The generosity of Carolyn Cort has given the Association a new building for use in preserving Yancey County history. Much effort has been expended in moving from the old office 40 steps above the old library to the new office in the new building. A genealogical library has been created and meetings are regularly held on the subject. The building, named the Lloyd Bailey Annex of the Yancey History Association, was officially dedicated on June 25th. The dedication was followed by a piano concert performed by Lily Chou in the First Baptist Church. We wish to thank all the friends of Dr. Bailey and the Association for their generous donations during the dedication ceremonies. We have a limited supply of volume III and V of Dr. Bailey's definitive Toe River Valley series on local history. At present, a very interesting quilt display is on exhibit, courtesy of the Asheville Quilting Guild. We are actively planning for exciting use of our new facility. This new facility will also allow more appropriate displays in the McElroy House, current home of the Rush Wray Museum of Yancey County History. Interest seems to be gaining momentum as we are getting new volunteers for work in the office and other Association issues. We need office volunteers so that our manager will be free to conduct tours and maintain the McElroy house while keeping the office open. As historical displays are presented also in the Lloyd Bailey Annex, this need becomes critical. We seem on the edge of being able to accomplish great things for Yancey County historical preservation and education.

Nevertheless, we are on an edge and can go either way. I cannot sugar-coat our financial situation. The Board previous to me committed the Association to a \$20,000+ debt in publishing 5000 copies of a paperback book on the McElroy House. This was done as a fund-raiser. In June 2007, when the final bill is due, we will still owe about \$14,000 by my

best guess. I appreciate all the people who have purchased this book, and especially Mountain Air's purchase of 300 books. To sell any of the books, we had to reduce the price from the initial \$12.95 to \$7.95. They simply have not sold and it is not from lack of effort. The Association is simply not equipped to handle on-line sales or credit card sales. This has perhaps impeded our efforts somewhat, but the bottom line is that we have not been able to sell the book

We have received a very devastating blow in that the county was not able to fund many of the non-profits outside of vital health and emergency agencies this year and likely next year as well. We have counted on the \$6,000 we received from them each year to pay for museum staff and curator. The town was again able to fund the \$1,000, same as they funded last year and for that we are very thankful. However it will not be enough to meet expenses on it's own. At present, we have only the rent from the Chamber of Commerce Building (\$800/month) as a source of income. Thanks to hard work, we did do well on sales of "Images of Yancey". We also had a successful yard sale. Without continued fundraising efforts, we cannot meet operating expenses, let alone the book debt. With fundraising efforts, we must get one dollar in public donations for each two raised or lose our tax-exempt status. Losing that status would be the death of the Association (my opinion). We need some sort of corporate sponsorship for at least a portion of our operating expenses which are about \$23,000/year. An endowment of \$500,000 would allow us to live on the interest for a long while, but that is not likely.

Of course, member contributions can make a large difference. Two hundred members donating \$50 gives us \$10,000, enough to get by with the rental income. The board and staff have worked hard and given the association many hours. It is now your turn to get involved. With the financial support of our members we can not only survive but grow as we have these past two years. It has been an honor to serve with the dedicated core of people that have made the Yancey History Association successful. It is a simple fact that this core of people willing to work and/or contribute must expand. I have confidence that the people of Yancey County will do what is necessary to see that the association and museum become stable once again. *Bucky Cochrane*

This, That & The Other...our genealogy and history corner

Levi Metcalf was born in Buncombe County, NC in 1821. He was the son of James Metcalf, Jr., who settled in Buncombe County about 1790. Levi's mother was Mary Ann Oxford, daughter of Samuel and Bathsheba (Barrett) Oxford. Levi had one brother and eight sisters, they were: Rev. Jacob Metcalf married (m) Elizabeth Buckner; Nancy married John Buckner; Sally (m) Larkin Chandler; Lucinda (m) Martin Chandler, Eadie (m) Robert Crawford; Rebecca (m) Haley Buckner, (m) Ransom Merril; Matilda (m) Jackson Ingle; Cecelia (m) Washington Burlison.

In 1847 Levi married Drucilla Hunt, daughter of Henry Hunt of Ivy Hill section of Buncombe County. The Hunts came into NC from Augusta, GA. Drucella had three sisters; Matilda (m) Jim Whitt; Cynthia (m) (?) Myers; and Ludinda.

Levi and Drucilla had four children: Mary, born about 1848; Julia, in 1869, married North Bend McLean, who was born in Yancey County, the son of Daniel and Elizabeth (Clubb) McClean; James Henery, married Mary Margaret Ramsey; Robert, born about 1853, moved to KY.

Levi died in 1859. The inventory of his estate lists numerous people indebted to him. In her later years, Drucilla married John Ramsey. In 1900 she is listed as a widow living with her son James Henery. She lived to be nearly 100 years old and is buried at Gabriels Creek in Madison County. Levi's burial place is unknown.

Rev. Jacob Metcalf is my great-great-great grandfather. His daughter Lucretia married Mitchell Alexander Wilson, my great grandfather. Rev. Metcalf married Elizabeth Buckner, daughter of Samuel Oxford and Bathsheba Barrett. She was the daughter of Jonathon Barrett (born early 1700's) and the first permanent white settler in the area now Alexander County. He married JarFly Jarmin (Catawba Indian), she had died by 1760. They had three children: Bathsheba; Abel (he was dark skinned like the Indians), he went with them when they left the Catawba River area of NC. Elizabeth married John King; Jonathon married and had two children: Jonathon and Jerusa.

Our Own Literary Festival Storyteller: "War Within a War" by Jim Priesmeyer

Using excerpts from two of his one man - one act plays, Gen. John Wesley McElroy in "A Final Farewell" and Montraville Ray in "Skedaddle", Jim Priesmeyer will present a clear picture of the internal conflict on the home front in Yancey County during the War Between the States. Mr. Priesmeyer intertwines the perspectives of these two adversarial historical figures in an informative and entertaining presentation.

As the Home Guard General charged with keeping a fragile, if not impossible, peace McElroy carried the weight of the world on his shoulders. Ray on the other hand served his one year enlistment in the Confederate Army and returned home labeled a deserter and traitor for refusing to continue fight for a cause he did not support. The conflict between these two men, both from prominent and powerful local families, came to a head in April of 1864 when Ray's Renegades captured the Town of Burnsville.

Which of these opposing forces will prevail? Following the two sketches Jim will entertain questions and provide the broad picture of the war within the war.

Annual Meeting and Proposed By-laws changes_

As the association grows, we have to be better prepared to meet the changing needs of our twofold task; the museum and the history association. Over the past few months we have begun the development of operating policies and procedures to help us as we continue into the 21st century "here in our little neck of the woods". We have better book keeping for both entities, a guidebook for volunteers and a way of tracking their volunteer hours as well as monetary contributions. In putting some of these tools in place we realize the need for some new provisions in the existing by-laws. The following changes are to be considered [recommendation of the board of directors] for approval at the upcoming annual meeting in October.

Proposal Additions:

Section I: Purpose

To reinstate the wording as addressed in the 1979 original bylaws as follows:

Paragraph one: ... preserving, exhibiting and interpreting those collections, records including **genealogical record**, artifacts or structures which relate to the settlement and development of Yancey County, North Carolina.

Under Section II: Organization; Paragraph 3.

Change the position of Vice-President into:

"1st Vice President will serve as Program Chairperson and will still serve as president-elect".

"2nd Vice-President primary duty will be to serve as the Editor of the Newsletter".

Paragraph 6: Add

"Historian will serve as the keeper of the association's activities and history".

Section II: Standing Committees

Section II: Organization Sub-Section Standing Committees:

Add; paragraph 3

"Audit Committee will include of the president, one other board member and two members of the general membership in good standing. The audit committee will be responsible for an annual financial review/audit to be completed in the 4th quarter of the year and prior to the annual meeting. The report will be presented by the committee chairperson at the annual meeting". An audit tool has already been developed for their use".


Membership Committee: needs volunteers, you may be receiving a call in the near future and asked to serve.
