Annex Project Underway

Several Items are needed; will you help us!

We are excited to see the association is going through a growth phase at present. Again; thanks is due to Dr. Carolyn Cort's building donation. In the early days of having the building we went through many ideas as how best to utilize the space for, display, archive space, genealogy library, conference and meeting room and rental for added income. The board has now settled on three proposed phases in creating the best use of all the space.

The first phase (I) is creating a display area in the lower level of the annex building. The displays will create a time line of Yancey County's history.

Beginning with the Pre-History or Indian inhabitation of our many hills and valleys here within the Cane River valley and it's many tributaries, displaying many artifacts from the Paleo Indian Period (spear and arrow points), to the Late Woodland Period (points and ceramics).

The theme will continue as one walks along the old boardwalk stopping to see details of the early history of our county around 1834. You will continue past shops, school, church, mining and harness shop displays. There will be a tribute to the many soldiers from our area who served in the American Revolution, War of 1812, Indian Removal, Civil War, WWI, WWII and for now will stop during the period of the Vietnam Conflict. Finally we will pay tribute to our name sake Rush Wray with a display centering around the Parkway Playhouse and other artists and musicians from our county.

Phase II will be a renovation of the upstairs south side to form a genealogy library and conference center.

Phase III will be modernizing and upgrading the apartment space as rental use.

Donations have begun to come in for old wood from out buildings and barns for use in the veneer to add to the charm of the days gone by in our area.

At this time we are asking for items that would either be donated as a gift to the association for museum display or as a long term loan for display. We are focusing this drive on obtaining items for the old combination school and church house display. Things such as a teacher's desk and chair, short (4 foot) church pew, bookcase, books form 1840-1940, chalk boards, old lard bucket for a lunch pail. 

Annex Phase One Project


See the article in this newsletter. So add this to your list of projects to donate to.
