

The county was originally part of both Burke and Buncombe Counties so Yancey was established in 1833. It was named for Bartlett Yancey. Burnsville our county seat was named for Captain Otway Burns. Both of these gentlemen were in the legislature of North Carolina, one in the house and the other in the senate. Yancey's county seat was christened in honor of Otway Burns, another native of Yancey County. He was noted naval officer during the war of 1812, and commanded the United States privateer "Snapdragon". In the town named

in his honor stands today a monument erected by the people of Burnsville and Yancey County, commemorating his brave deeds in the second war for American independence.

Lumbering industry brought in at least two railroads, one into the Pensacola the other to the Dave Buck place at the head of Bald Mountain and down into Huntdale's forest lands. These have long vanished once the industry faded into history so did the trains.

Bridal Gown Exhibit


Sorry! This one is past; however we had a great turn out and will plan to have it again next year. For those who missed it here is a picture from the exhibit.

*NEW! Updated Yancey County Cemetery Two-Book Set *

(Will make a nice Christmas Gift) containing some 569 cemeteries in Yancey.

The cost of the set is \$64 dollars (includes tax). Postage is an additional \$7 dollars. You may reserve a copy by sending your check made payable to: Yancey History Association, 3 Academy Street, Burnsville, NC 28714; Ph 828-678-9587; or by stopping by the office which is open Wednesday-Saturday from 10-4.

The book orders are filled within 3 weeks typically, you will receive a call from the office once your books are ready to be picked up. We do not have extra copies available for sale, so please place your pre-published order soon. Pre-published orders will be honored through October 2009, after that the books will be available in limited number in the gift shop at a cost of \$69 dollars per set tax with \$7.00 for shipping per set not included.

The new book is improved by dividing the cemeteries into county townships with a current township map to aid you in locating the sites along with alphabetical indexing by Cemetery Name. Since there are near 20,000 names at this time there is no individual deceased persons index. Maybe in the future this can be compiled.

Please note: The former cemetery book set released this spring is no longer available. However a supplemental volume # 3 is available for those who purchased the first set, at a cost of \$19 includes tax, shipping is extra at \$5.00 per book. This volume contains the 140 cemeteries that are newly updated in the NEW set.


2nd and Final Notice


