

#### PRESIDENT'S LETTER -

As we say goodbye to 2009 I would like to thank The Yancey County History Association's Board members and volunteers for their contributions in making this a successful year. 2009 ended on a frigid note however with the cancellation of our annual Christmas candlelight tours due to the heavy snowfall. It was very disappointing to those of us who took part in decorating The McElroy House and in the food preparation for the event. One of the brave souls who made it out in the snow said she couldn't remember the museum looking better for Christmas." It's the little things that make it all worthwhile. And we feel a little better as we pack things away while looking forward to holiday season 2010 when we can do it all over again.

Looking back at some of our achievements of the past year one stands out above all. We were at long last able to pay off the large book publishing debt that has been hanging over our heads for these many years. We are now debt free and can once again apply for some much needed grants. Another achievement we are proud of is the opening of our Hall Of Honor in The Lloyd Bailey Annex. The Hall Of Honor is dedicated to the veterans of Yancey County to whom we all owe a debt of gratitude for the freedom we enjoy today. We also dismantled the pre-Civil War Proffit Cabin and moved it to the museum grounds. We hope to begin the process of reassembling it in the coming year.

We were able to accomplish all this and more with an all volunteer staff and a small budget. If you would like to help keep the history of Yancey County alive - give us a call, or stop by the museum, we'll be glad to show you around and tell you what we're all about. You'll be glad you did and so will we.

#### 2009 Financial Report - as prepared by Elaine Dellinger, Treasurer

For the first time in about six years the association is DEBT FREE! We are celebrating! What debt you might be saying? An earlier board approved the publishing of a paperback book called "Glimpses of Yancey County and the McElroy House". The book was designed as a basic inexpensive book some 75 pages in length to be sold at \$11.95 per copy, which would be paid over a three-year period, toward the contract agreement of 5,556 copies at the cost including freight of \$20,600. The board was told in 2000-2002 that this was very marketable and we stood to make a profit over time of \$18,000 or so.

As different boards came in to place we continued not to be able to sell the book, the only large sales was to Mt. Air some 300 books which they would give to their clients. A year and half into the contract we reduced the price per copy of the book to \$7.95 in an effort to see if in doing so sales would increase - they didn't. The contract was to be paid in full from sales by the end of 36 months. The then president of the board contacted Walsworth Publishing [a division of Donning] and asked for an extension of three more years and the board agreed to reduce the price of the book to \$4.95 and work harder to promote sales. Several groups were contacted and offers for bulk sales were made but none of these accepted YHA's offer.

With this 3-year period quickly passing and with the knowledge that our main income was the rent received from the Chamber of Commerce [for the old gas station building].

The chamber would stop paying rent, in December 2009, per the contract the Chamber made with YHA. They would assume all expenses at that time and if the property was ever to be sold they had the first option to purchase it for the cost of only one dollar.

By September 2008 we still owed almost \$14,000 on the book. The board made a very difficult decision by letting the only part-time paid position be terminated in an effort to use the rent of \$800 per month toward the book debt payment. The board felt that with the grant pools drying up we would not stand a good chance in even applying when our debt was a great as our income. (We had several grant possibilities on hold already due to the budget status.) It was calculated that we would be debt free by January 2010 if we accepted this plan. As a direct result of our decision, along with four fundraisers to help on expenses in 2008-09 the debt was paid in full in October 2009.

Thus NEW CHALLENGE was how would we operate as usual with no paid staff, our museum manager had operated the annex and museum from Wednesday-Saturday from 10-4 in all months except Jan and Feb where we were only open Friday and Saturday to keep within budget.

Each board member was asked to begin immediately to help find us enough volunteers to keep the association and museum in operation. It has not been easy and at times only through the volunteer efforts of 3-4 people. We are again at a point we need new volunteers more than ever before. (Most of our volunteers are retired and with the golden years comes sickness and health problems.) For this reason, we find we lose some every six months it seems.

If the association is to be successful we need volunteers, would you consider asking folks you know [who like yourself enjoy history and antiques] to volunteer this winter.

A formal orientation is given and you will work with another volunteer until you are comfortable working alone.

We have been fortunate that over the last few years we have had help from community service workers, summer interns,

and at present a young lady from the DSS "Work First" program is helping us.

The 2010 budget of \$22,000 is something we feel we will be able to sustain only through the primary support of the town and county which accounts for about half of the budget, while we no longer will be receiving the rent from the Chamber we do have one apartment we rent for \$400 per month and a studio one room we rent for \$200 per month this includes utilities with an exception of the electricity if it goes over \$50 per month they will be billed the difference.

So what is the up side after such a lengthy financial report, we have been given the proceeds from the sale of the Yancey County Cemetery book (Continued of next page.)



(continued) set which was published by Gwen Bodford and Elaine Dellinger, with the money to go toward the genealogy library of which a third account has been set up specific for this purpose and the account has more than \$1200 at this time.

The primary account allows for general operations. It has more than \$7,000 currently, while the special projects account contains more than \$6,000 designated toward the museum with \$5,000 of that amount a gift from the estate of Neva Renaldo, a long time friend of Winnie Lou Ray, and the museum family. Plans are underway to complete the hardwood flooring in the parlor and refinish the foyer at the same time. The Plexiglas

panels are to be replaced over the old handmade window-lights. Some roof issues will be addressed and a bit of new paint will give a facelift to some of the walls all scheduled to happen before we open in April 2010.



We have served more than 250 school age children this year on site with our docents [tour guides] in period dress. We look forward to your continued support and growth in the months and years ahead. All in all we have had a very good year as we say goodbye to 2009 and say 'hello' to the next decade.


Museum offers a unique opportunity for all of us to contribute - whether through membership, to offer contributions of historic materials or to be involved in the many activities of the Association.

Our winter schedule is Friday and Saturday from 10-4 from January through February and back to four days per week in March.


