
The Living History Room was beautifully decorated by Virginia Lovejoy of The Design Gallery.

Other Notable Events of the Past Year

Grants: The Community Foundation of Western North Carolina awarded the Y.H.A. a Technology Grant which has allowed us to put sound and a recorded tour in each room of the Museum and to produce videos to enhance Museum visits. We have also begun conducting video interviews with our senior citizens allowing us to capture the genuine experience of growing up in Yancey County. This fall we received \$20,000 from the Janirve Foundation to reconstruct the front porch and the chimneys.

Displays: The Museum received the loan of the "Schmidt Collection" which consists of points, projectiles and other tools and artifacts found at a single sight in the Green Mountain area of our county. This collection combined with the on loan "John Young Collection" has made it possible for the Museum to create an exhibit that spans fourteen thousand years of human habitation of Yancey County.


