#### From the President.

As we begin a new year of operations, the Association is faced with several challenges. How we meet these challenges will determine our success in preserving our local heritage. Time is not on our side as anyone can easily see the rapid loss of what has made the mountain area special and unique. The mountain culture has always been different enough from, say, "typical southern culture" that it has occupied a special place of its own. "Mountain man" or "mountain people" conjures images of ruggedly independent people who were true to their family and principles. As the landscape evolves with a growing native population and, particularly, an influx of new people, change is inevitable. Without a concerted effort, much of what has made this area special will be lost.

The Board presently consists of six people, four of whom have jobs or businesses. We cannot do it all. Progress is being made; for example, the 1860's vintage smokehouse has been dismantled, moved, and reassembled on the museum grounds. At present the roof is awaiting a shake single covering. The Sons of Confederate Veterans (SCV) did the work on the smokehouse. While we appreciate their efforts, we, as the Yancey History Association (YCH), cannot always be dependent on such good graces. We must supply manpower and money to accomplish tasks. The Association has been given a log cabin dating to the 1860's. The SCV does not have the resources to move this potential treasure and I don't know whom in the Association I can call upon to help in such matters. When these structures are gone, they are lost. Lost with them is the concrete example of workmanship and spirit that produced them.

The Association has a heavy obligation in selling its book on the McElroy House. Noted local author Michael Hardy and his wife produced the book as a public service to the Association. The Association purchased 5,000 copies of the book to sell. Despite good efforts by some of our members, we've sold less than 200 copies. I urge members to purchase copies of this interesting book for themselves and as gifts. I am open to any marketing ideas. This obligation may have serious consequences for the YHA.

As usual, we need money and time. A YHA yard sale is being held at Dogwood Flats on Lower George's Fork on the 29th and 30th of April. Please donate. We have interesting programs by qualified historians. Typically, seven people attend. Please show your interest in our history by your presence. Let the Association know of any talents, or just a willingness to work on your part. We need you. Start the year off right by attending the commemoration of the "Battle of Burnsville" on the 23rd and 24th of April. Show your pride and interest in our history, be active! ## This, That & The Other ... our new genealogy and history corner

Strawbridge Young born March 4, 1772; Died December 16, 1834 (Birth date found in the Bible of his daughter, Nellie Young), which is owned by Dr. Miles Wyatt. (Death date found in the bible of his son, George Young, which is owned by Hettie Young). Strawbridge Young was the progenitor of all Youngs in Yancey County. One legend about his name is that he was born on a ship after the family had escaped capture by some group of people. In order for the family to escape without arousing the townspeople, they put straw on the bridge. So that their horses would make little noise. Another legend is that he was born on a covered bridge located on the border of Northern Ireland. This legend also indicates that the family was being pursued by Catholics (It is not known whether Roman or Angelian.) Other descendants say that he was given the name in early manhood, after escaping lawmen by putting straw on a bridge. In that the Young family was closely related with the Methodist Church. Strawbridge Young was evidently named for Robert Strawbridge, first Methodist minister in Colonial America.. Robert Strawbridge was born in Drummersnave. County Loitrim, Ireland. He was one of two sons of Robert Strawbridge. He emigrated to Maryland and settled on Sam's Creek, Frederick County. He preached in Virginia, Delaware, and Pennsylvania. Francis Asbury resented him greatly and commented in his journal that the death of Robert Strawbridge helped the growth of the Methodist Church tremendously. Robert Strawbridge died in August, 1781. Most of the early families of Burke and Yancey Counties came from this same area in Maryland. The ancestors of Strawbridge Young evidently came from there. Several deeds registered in the Yancey County Court House just a few months before Strawbridge Young's death convey his property to his sons. His home was located just below the graveyard where he and most of his sons are buried. This graveyard, called the "Mammy Young Cemetery" is located in the Newdale Community off the Spruce Pine Road to the left of Rice Road. Older living descendants have identified the stone of Strawbridge Young as the tallest one on the crest of the hill. The first meeting house of the Methodist Church in Yancey County was the home of Strawbridge Young. The church was later moved to a new location and the name changed from "Young;' s Meeting House" to Martin's Chapel Methodist Church. The new name was taken from a Rev. Martin an early circuit rider in the area. Strawbridge Young married, Martha ".Pattie" Wilson. Born February 8, 1771; Died April

#### **Curator's Report**

Spring is just around the corner and for the History Association that means the Museum will soon be open. This year promises to be another fine one. Before we look ahead let us take a moment to glance back at the progress and events of the past few months.

During the Fall and Winter the Sons of Confederate Veterans completed the walls, roof rafters and dried in the hand hewed log smokehouse with an extended well protection overhang. The S.C.V. took on this project because we believe the structure was built by a Confederate Veteran. There will be pictures and more details in the next Estatoee.

The second part of this project was the well excavation by the Museum Manager Colette Blankenship and myself lead by board member and archeology student Elaine Dellinger. The purpose of the project is to get the closest possible look at the people who lived in the McElroy house by examining what they threw down the well once it was abandoned and converted into a trash pit in the early 1900's.

As you may know, as the result of a freak accident, Elaine gave a very close examination to the bottom of the 45 foot deep well. She was probably the first to see the bottom in more than 150 years. What you are likely unaware of is that Elaine is still undergoing extensive physical therapy as a result of the unexpected 40 foot fall. Your thoughts and prayers for the complete recovery of this dedicated and wonderful person would be greatly appreciated.

In other news, the annual meeting last October marked the end of a two year transition period. This transition has developed a stronger more engaged board of directors. A board that is ready to and needs to grow. An intricate part of this development has been the Museum Assessment Program that is being funded by the Institute for Museum and Library Services. This Federal Government program was created through a partnership with the American Association of Museums (A.A.M.).

The board with the assistance of museum staff and volunteers Howard and Susan Smith have completed the self study portion of the assessment. Which will lead to a field visit by a A.A.M. field assessor followed by an in depth report with recommendations that will help in planning the future of our museum.






